

What is it about a place that captures our imagination, clings to our memories, and infuses our daily lives? Can its presence be conveyed by careful documentation of dimensions, stories told, the light of a window on a wall, or the ephemera inhabiting it? Though the artists included in On Location take many different approaches, place is central to their art.

The Road

The open road is a powerful symbol in American culture. This is no surprise in a country whose residents collectively spend 70 billion hours behind the wheel each year. Sky Hopinka, Maria Gonella, and Caitie Sellers—all artists who site having moved from place to place when talking about themselves and their work—use the road as a metaphor for change, displacement, and connection.

Sky Hopinka (Ho-Chunk Nation/ Pechanga Band of Luiseño Indians) was born and raised in Ferndale, Washington and spent a number of years in Palm Springs and Riverside, California; Portland, Oregon; and Milwaukee. His short film Kunjkaga Remember Red Banks, Kunjkaga Remembers the Welcoming Song traverses the history and the memory of a place shared by both the Ho-Chunk and the settler. Red Banks, a precontact Ho-Chunk village site near present day Green Bay, was also the landing site of Jean Nicolet, who in 1634 was the first European in what is today Wisconsin. Sky begins and ends the film with the sound of his grandmother's recollections played over footage of the expressway on a rainy night, shot from a car driving I-43 between Milwaukee and Green Bay.



The Built Environment

Roads are just one part of the built environment—the human-made systems, structures, and spaces in which people live, work, and recreate. These are the places we both shape and are shaped by. Accordingly, these spaces are the focus of many artists' work.

Kat Cole, Michael Nashef, and Raymundo T. Reynoso look to the city. For his Functional Resilience series, Michael Nashef draws on his time living in war-torn Lebanon. Despite all the damage to Lebanese architecture, the buildings are still able to shelter people due to the stability and strength of the cement used to make them. Michael's vessels are distilled representations of these buildings. Not only did he draw on the language of Lebanese architecture, he also developed processes innovative and methods for working with cement while creating them.

Interiors

While Michael focuses on exteriors, the interiors portrayed by Brianna Harlan, Richard McGuire, and Eric Parra each have stories to tell. In November of 2020, Brianna spent nine days in the hospital. While there, she filled over 33 pages with labeled rubbings of her surroundings. All of these fragments combine to suggest a narrative of Brianna's stay. From the lids of a Dole peaches cup and water pitcher we imagine a meal of hospital on a tray, from the 'thinking of you' card, a longed-for visitation.





Abandoned Places

Elysia Michaelsen, Tomiko Jones, and Krista Svalbonas are all interested in abandoned places, whether just off season or left behind in a changing economy. As family farming is being replaced industrial agriculture in rural areas of Krista's home state of Pennsylvania, the barns that once dotted the landscape are disappearing. In their varied architecture, she sees the immigrants traditions brought from their home countries in other times of change. Krista has been traveling around taking photographs of these structures to document the vanishing rural industrial landscape. For her *In the* Presence of Memory series, Krista silk-screened architectural details from these images on industrial felt (manufactured in Pennsylvania) using industrial pigments such as steel, iron, and copper. She then painted each piece individually using oil and cold wax and cut into the felt, echoing the empty and thatched spaces of the often-dilapidated structures she photographed.

In contrast to these abandoned places, John Smither's *Boulder Loop Trail* is bursting with life. While no one appears in the verdant panels scattering out from around a screen on which painted branches fade in and out over video of the forest, the bright songs of birds and sound of passing hikers fill our ears.

THE ARTISTS

KAT COLE looks to the built environment, the city in which she lives, for the formal qualities of her work: materials, forms, color and surface quality.
